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

This includes classroom rules as well as policies that must be adhered outside of school. Your school diary has lots of information so make sure you read through it thoroughly. -Parmiss.

TIMETABLES! Written by Jasmin and Natalie Gilmore. Yr 7 at GHS.

Timetables can be confusing sometimes, but when you know how to use them, they are very helpful. Knowing which classroom to go to next is very important, but knowing where your class is a bit tricky if you don't know how to use your timetable.

Here is a diagram of the timetable you will get when you come here.

The colours also help you figure out your timetable. Every class is different, and they are colour coded. For example, science is in light blue, maths is in red, etc.. This may be a little confusing,



and we will try and decode it as well as we can.

There are two (2) weeks in a cycle; Week A and Week B. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday on both weeks are the same with bell times. There are five periods in a day, as well as lunch and recess. Period 1 is at 9:00am. Period 2 is at 10:10. Recess is at 11:10, Period 3 is at 11:30, Period 4 is at 12:30, Lunch is at 1:30 and Period 5 is at 2:10. The day ends at 3:10pm. Wednesdays are a little different, though. Wednesday Week A has the same start and end time, but lunch is after Period 3, at 12:30, and Period 4 is at 1:10. This is because on Wednesday afternoons you have a special subject called Enrichment, which is fun and gives you a chance to hang out with your friends in other classes. On Wednesday Week B. school ends 25 minutes earlier. This is because of

assembly. Assembly goes for 35 minutes, from 10:10 to 10:45, instead of Period 2.

As you can see, in each coloured box there are a bunch of numbers and letters, which don't appear to be in any particular order, e.g. 7MAO: CHOE A15. Your class, for example, 7O, has been split. The 7 is at the front,

and the O is at the back of the first "word". Those two letters in the middle stand for the subject. Maths is MA, Health is HE, English is ENG, Agriculture is AGR, etc. Then there is a colon, which means equals, then it tells you your teacher, and what room you are in. CHOE could be Mr E Choy, and A15 is a classroom in the A block. (A10 - A19 are on the top floor). You will see . The coloured boxes represent each period and class. Every class is coloured coded, so if you see red on your timetable, that might mean maths. If you see orange or bright yellow on your timetable, it means that you don't have a class then, or its lunch or recess. A white box means that you will have assembly or enrichment, which you will learn about later.
