PRINCIPAL'S NEWS

Hello and welcome to Term 4. It is a busy time at GHS as we prepare for the end of one school year with assessment and reporting and begin to plan for next year with curriculum preparation and timetabling. This newsletter marks the end of my time as Relieving Principal. Lynne Searle returns next week after travelling Australia and a little of Europe this year. I would like to take a moment to thank Glenda Horner for relieving as Deputy Principal over the last 12 months and Ravi Titheradge for stepping up into the Head Teacher Welfare role. We really do have a marvellous school community and it has been a pleasure to lead it in Lynne's absence.

On the 1st November we will have a team visit our school to participate in Validation. Validation is an initiative of the Department of Education that supports schools to critically assess their achievements and identify areas for change by providing a transparent description of quality practices to underpin school planning and selfassessment. As a school community over the last 12 months we have used the School Excellence Framework to conduct a self-assessment that was evidence-based and identified explicit school practices that are directly related to continuous, school-wide improvement and better student outcomes. We identified evidence of quality practice across the key domains of education -Learning, Teaching and Leading. This process has enabled us to make informed judgements and plan the next steps for improvement in our 2017 iteration of the school plan. Gary Bennett will be discussing the process of Validation at this week's Parent Learning Group prior to the P&C meeting. I will be unable to make this meeting and PLG as I will be at the Leadership Camp supporting our student leaders of 2017 to devise their 12 month plan for action.

Student leadership is a role that is not small or tokenistic in our school context. We promote an inverted pyramid

of leadership which emphasises the importance of service, integrity and school pride. We firmly believe that all young people have the potential to be leaders and that leadership can manifest in many different ways, be it through involvement in academic, sporting, cultural and community pursuits. The whole school community benefits from the promotion of student voice in planning and decision-making, while our young people are empowered to be active and engaged in making choices which affect their learning and the learning of their peers. This team will be the voice of all GHS students and I am very excited to see how big they dream over the next three days.

In the 21st century world our students and staff are becoming increasingly concerned about environmental sustainability. Our sustainability team have been investigating ways to be more efficient and sustainable. This has included whole school audits, renewing contracts with suppliers with sustainable practices where possible and being more accountable for our waste and plastic usage. One initiative that I recently discussed at P&C was the move to electronic reporting for 7-10 students. Semester 2 reports this year will be available via Sentral Parent Portal as an eReport. Those families that would like a paper copy will be able to request that however we are increasingly finding that most reports are asked to be emailed to parents as reports have been lost, misplaced or neglected. In addition scholarships and recruitment companies require applications to be made online and ecopies of reports enable that process to run smoothly. We look forward to your feedback on this great initiative.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Welcome to a busy Term 4 which is well under way. This term marks significant transition and planning for the next year for most year groups. In particular, Year 12 are well into their HSC exams with some students already nearing completion while they consider future pathways. From all reports our Year 12 students have approached the papers with confidence founded on high levels of preparation, particularly with the support of teachers during the 'holidays' and in the lead up to individual papers in the early part of the term.

Year 11 completed their Preliminary HSC exams at the end of last term and have received valuable feedback from teachers as they embark on their HSC studies in Term 4. Year 11 have now completed the Preliminary Course. They are now regarded as Year 12 2017 and have been issued with their new timetables this week. Please note these can be viewed on the student and parent portal. Important information will be issued over the next week including the school's 2016-17 HSC Assessment Booklet and BOSTES guide to the HSC. A copy of this document will be placed on the website and it contains important policy information for students and carers regarding HSC requirements. Year 11 Yearly reports will be completed and sent home in the coming weeks. Our newly inducted leadership team have already commenced their service, in particular leading and presenting at our weekly assemblies and will develop their portfolios and initiatives at the leadership camp this week.

Year 10 move closer to the completion of stage 5 and their 'junior' schooling and electives for next year

discussed and released this term. They will be completing a pre-requisite course for the HSC called HSC All My Own Work which provides an essential introduction to the expectations for Senior study. Year 10 will also be participating in a visit to Macquarie University and Wellbeing week coordinated by their Year Adviser Mr Singh with a number of activities organised. More details will be sent to carers soon.

Year 7 will be provided information about the study of a Language other than English (LOTE). In Year 8 students undertake 100 hours of study of ONE language (i.e. 4 periods per fortnight) as stipulated by the Department of Education. In 2016 students will have the opportunity to complete their preferences online. More details are to follow via letter and email.

Visual Art:


Year 9 Sculpture Unit:



In our art unit "The Body - Sculpture" we were given the task to create a sculpture of the human body using cardboard. We started by taking photos of classmates and transferring them into sketches of the human figure. We then simplified this sketch to a basic, boxy shape and then even further to the planes of the figure. We then sketched our final image to actual size and prepared our materials. Some people chose to use thick card paper and others chose to bring in packaging cardboard. We cut out planes of the body and created slits in them so we could slot them in to other sections of the figure. It was challenging with the lightweight material to keep the structural integrity and many had to change their initial ideas to accommodate to the flimsy nature of the material. Everyone took a slightly different approach and the final sculptures were versatile and very successful.

Shaun Tan Exhibition - Year 9 Visual Arts



In Term 3, the Year 9 art students travelled to the Grace Cossington Smith Gallery at Wahroonga to see the work of Shaun Tan. a successful children's book illustrator.

The gallery displayed Tan's works 'The Art of Story Discovering,' highlighting his most popular project 'The Lost Thing.' Throughout the century old building, the exhibition displayed the complex stages in which Tan completed his artwork. This included his annotations and his process of the adaptation of the picture book into a short picture film. By observing the artworks metaphors and underlining meanings, concepts behind each illustration were uncovered. This helped provide us with ideas of how to create successful visual artworks that had more to them than just aesthetics. This experience did not only change the depth at which we, as students, view artworks but will be extremely valuable for our current unit, 'Book Illustration.' By basing our upcoming illustrations on Shaun Tan's work we are able to guarantee that the experience will be beneficial to our future work, allowing us to experiment with his colour palette and theme.

Changes to Student Services at GHS

The Learning Hub has continued to be pivotal in supporting those students who have struggled to keep ahead of their studies for a variety of reasons.

Our services now extend to separate supervision for exams for students qualifying for that service, one on one tutoring when applicable and the organisation of peer tutoring for maths. Recently we have added lunch time literacy classes for our students for which English is their second language to assist them to prepare more effectively for essay writing.

We now have a vibrant Aboriginal team consisting of Mr Titheradge, Mr Shelley and Ms Jocie who meet regularly with our wonderful Indigenous students. They have been participating in workshops and meetings with Henry Kendall High School, raising cultural awareness by organising a cupcake stall on August 9th (International Day of the World's Indigenous People) and are currently planning an Aboriginal garden in a part of our school that really needs updating. We can't wait to see the finished product which will include bush tucker, seating, Aboriginal artwork and totem poles.



In addition to our Learning Hub next to the Head Teacher Welfare's office and the Head Teacher Teaching and Learning/LAST's office, we would like to announce the opening of the Learning Pod. This is located on the second storey within the Mathematics Faculty. This room is available to be booked through the Learning Hub for meetings with parents and will be predominately used by Year Advisers for parental meetings, tutoring, separate exam supervision, and teacher/student meetings. We offer two personal computers and two laptops in this room which added to our three laptops in the Learning Hub provides learning support staff with ample work spaces to assist students with their work on a daily basis.

Furthermore, the Hub's fortnightly flyer called "Hubs Helping Hand" available through the SMORE website is keeping teachers updated with the latest readings about issues such as Autism, Differentiation, students with other disabilities, tips and strategies for working collaboratively and much more.

It certainly is an exciting time at GHS where the staff involved with the Student Services such as the H/T Welfare, H/T Teaching and Learning and LAST, the two Counsellors and three SLSOs, have now got room to move, room to accommodate the variety of learners at our school and communicate our work to the teaching staff through the Sentral system.

HUMANITIES

It has been a busy time in Term 3 for teachers busily preparing their classes for the HSC with a diverse range of engaging curriculum activities. At the time of writing assessments are currently underway for all years.

Year 8 History has just completed a test essay task on Medieval History and last term an assignment on either ancient China or India. The Medieval Day was an outstanding success. Students were involved in a brilliant exposé of life in the Middle Ages and most got right into the spirit by adopting period dress for the day. The group "Living History" was superb and informed the students in a range of political, medical, military and social areas. Students participated in medieval dances, archery and games as part of the experience. Mrs Gray, Ms Scarr and Mrs Morgan all got into the spirit and impersonated noble ladies of the manor for the day.











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Year 9 have completed their Paradox of War presentations and last term had to complete an essay test on the Industrial Revolution. They are now starting their study of the Holocaust and the concepts of nationalism and racism which remain so relevant in our modern world. Mr McCumstie, Mrs Morgan and Mrs Gray have been extremely pleased with the level of commitment and the standard of work produced by their students.







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Year 10 have just completed a source-based essay and knowledge test on the Vietnam War era. Year 10 will be commencing a social, political and cultural study of a decade from the 1950s, 60s, 70s 80s and 90s this mav be raiding your record/cassette/CD collections or interviewing you about your experiences, all in their pursuit of higher learning. Recently all Year 10s were part of an interactive experience called the Freedom Rides which came to Gosford High. This was part of their study of Changing Rights and Freedoms for Aboriginal People throughout the 20th and 21st centuries. It was an excellent opportunity for the students to consolidate their learning of the period. The show was delivered by professional actors "in the round" and a number of our students were called on to don appropriate garb and assume characters from the period of 1965 to become part of the performance. This traced the journey of the Civil Rights activists campaigning against discriminatory practices towards Aboriginal people in many areas such as segregation in cinemas and swimming pools. It was a truly engaging and educational performance and showcased some latent acting talents in our midst.











Year 11 students have now started their Year 12 HSC courses in Ancient History (Ms Scarr and Mr Maguire), Modern History (Mr Wright and Ms Scarr), Extension History (Mr Wright), Studies of Religion (Mr Sneddon) and Society and Culture (Mrs Johnson) and are making good progress. Assessments will be upon them soon so it is important for each student to maintain strong homework and revision practices early in order to maximise their full potential in each course.



The 2016 cohort of Year 12 students have now completed the Modern History, Aboriginal Studies and Ancient History papers and the word from both students and teachers Mr Wright, Ms Scarr, Mr McCumstie and Mrs Morgan has been positive, and that the papers were challenging but fair, so that is good news. Extension History, Studies of Religion and Society and Culture are still to come.

High quality major projects by Gosford High Aboriginal Studies students were acknowledged by District Office and Aunty Eileen from the local Darkinjung Land Council which is a testament to both their enthusiasm and hard work.

Avid Year 12 ancient historian, Kathryn Molloy, has been selected into a degree in Archaeology at Macquarie University for the 2017 academic year. Kathryn was chosen from a large field of applicants prior to sitting the HSC based on her outstanding results. This is an extremely prestigious acknowledgement of her achievements in this area. Kathryn is extremely excited about pursuing a career in this ever expanding and technologically driven field of study. We all wish her well for the future.

Finally some very exciting Faculty news. Mrs Robertson (Miss Neville) is now the proud mum to a budding little historian Halle. On a recent visit, Halle was warmly welcomed by Mrs Robertson's Year 12 Modern History class, who had creatively applied their modern history skills with the gift of two cute little baby suits adorned with Abraham Lincoln and "Well behaved women barely make History"!!! ADOLESCENT SCOLIOSIS SPINAL CURVATURE



Information for schoolgirls in years 7 and 9 and their parents

A health promotion program recommended by the Spine Society of Australia. The program is endorsed by the Paediatrics and Child Health Divisi on of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians.

WHAT IS SCOLIOSIS?

Scoliosis is a lateral or sideways curve of the spine. The spine also rotates on its long axis as it curves. It usually develops during early adolescence (age 10-13 years) when growth is most rapid.

WHAT IS THE CAUSE OF SCOLIOSIS?

The cause is unknown, but 80-90% of cases occur in otherwise healthy adolescents. This is called idiopathic (cause unknown) scoliosis.

We know that scoliosis is NOT contagious and NOT caused by bad posture, a soft mattress, carrying a heavy school bag or junk food.


WHY IS EARLY DETECTION IMPORTANT? While very small curves are common and of no significance, about 2% of girls have a curve which warrants medical observation during the growth period. Three girls per 1,000 will require treatment during the growth phase. If treatment is required, the earlier it is undertaken, the better the long-term result. This is the basis for screening since in the early stages scoliosis produces no symptoms. The way to detect scoliosis is to look for it!

WHY THIS BROCHURE HAS BEEN PRODUCED

This brochure is designed to make parents of schoolgirls aware of the outward signs of scoliosis. From time to time all government and nongovernment schools in Australia will be asked to download this brochure from www.scoliosis-australia.org and to distribute it to girls in Years 7 and 9 (11 and 13 years of age in most states and territories).

WHAT ARE THE OUTWARD SIGNS OF SCOLIOSIS?



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HOW SCOLIOSIS IS DETECTED

Apart from the outward signs with a teenager standing as illustrated, the reliable Forward Bend Test is used in the diagnosis of scoliosis. This simple visual examination requires the teenager to stand with the feet together and parallel and bending forward as far as she can go with the hands, palms facing each other, pointed between the two big toes. In scoliosis, one side of the upper chest (thoracic) region or the lower back (lumbar) region will be more than 1cm higher than the other. The prominence is most often on the right side in the thoracic region. If the difference between the two sides is less than 1cm, it is highly unlikely that a significant curvature is present and the difference is simply due to asymmetrical growth of the two sides of the body. This is called torso asymmetry and is of no significance.

WHAT ABOUT BROTHERS AND SISTERS?

Scoliosis tends to run in families. When a curve is detected in one member of the family, other children should also be examined by the family doctor. If there is a history of a blood relative, especially a female cousin, having been treated for scoliosis by brace wearing or surgery, then this strengthens the case for spinal examination as a regular health check between 10 and 13 years of age.

Scoliosis which requires treatment is far less common in boys than in girls. The ratio of boys to girls requiring treatment is about 1 to 10.

IS TREATMENT SUCCESSFUL?

Yes, modern methods produce excellent results when a curve is detected early. In most cases an inconspicuous spinal brace is worn. Surgery is needed in only one out of three cases which require treatment.

There is no scientific evidence that physical therapy (exercise programs) and spinal manipulation (chiropractic adjustments) will either correct a scoliosis or halt its progression.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF SCOLIOSIS IS NOT TREATED?

The curve may increase unnoticed during the growing years. Moderate and severe curves may also increase in adult life. Some curves may increase with pregnancy. Severe pain, physical deformity and wear and tear arthritis may occur during middle life. Early detection is important for a healthy future.
