
#### **PRINCIPAL'S NEWS**

At this time of the year, it is important for all of us to think carefully about our learning. For students, it may well be about ensuring they finish the year strongly with final assessment tasks, tests, the completion of projects and ultimately assessment marks and grades being determined for end of year reports. For staff, we are now reflecting on 2017 and planning for our courses, programs and directions for 2018 and beyond.

Each of us needs to be positive in our approach to learning and strive for continual improvement. Some 30 years ago, Dr Carol Dweck coined the phrase 'Growth Mindset'. Since that time Dr Dweck has done additional research on brain plasticity which has shown how connectivity between neurons changes with experience. With practice, neural networks are strengthened and become more effective in 'message transmission'. These discoveries have confirmed that we can increase our learning capacity by the actions we take. Some of these include asking appropriate questions, practice and developing learning strategies, as well as good nutrition and sleep patterns.

At this time of year, when we have all been busy and we are looking towards the end of the year, it can be easy for us to think that we can't do any better. This 'fixed mindset' thwarts further improvement and stifles many of the processes that we have worked so hard on throughout the year. We need to look beyond what's going to happen with our final assessment tasks, tests and end of year reports to ensure that we are using them as just another stage in our learning continuum.

As a method of developing your 'growth mindset', Dr Dweck recognises questioning as vital to that process. How do you reflect on what you've done and strive for further improvement? The following diagram might give you some ideas.



As a school, we want everybody to continually improve. That will not occur if we continue doing things the way they've always been done. In all aspects of life, people are striving for bigger, better and faster. Remember ...

If you continue to do what you've always done, you're going to get what you've always gotten.

#### **HSC Begins**

Last week our Year 12 students began their HSC examinations. It was wonderful to see them back as a group on Monday morning, eager to begin the first of their English papers. In speaking with students after that first paper, most were more than happy with it and relieved that the examinations were finally underway.

The HSC examinations continue until Tuesday 7 November with the last of the examinations being Design and Technology and Drama.

At this early stage, I would like to pass on my thanks to the remainder of our students for the consideration that they have shown to our Year 12s in ensuring that noise is kept to a minimum around the school, giving them every opportunity to complete examinations under the most favourable conditions possible.

#### Student/Parent Information Evening

As one group of Year 12 students are exiting our school, another are beginning their final journey to the HSC. On Wednesday evening, 11 October, we hosted an Information Evening for the parents and students of our 2018 graduating class.

The concept behind presenting this opportunity for students and their parents was to make them aware of what it takes to be a successful student at an academically selective high school and how that can set them up for success beyond the HSC. Over the course of the evening we heard from Dr Troy Gaston, Senior Lecturer at the School of Environmental and Life Sciences, UON on the skills required to be a successful tertiary student; we heard from former GHS students Ryan Peters, Sue Jetley and Ruby Wharton on what GHS meant to them, their pathways through school, university and into the workforce; and we welcomed Ms Bernadette McCosker who has had students complete the HSC at GHS and another school in the area and has a son completing the HSC at GHS this year. Bernadette gave the perspective of 'surviving the HSC' from a parent's perspective.

We very much hope that this evening gave valuable insight into the ensuing 12 months for our students and their families and goes some way towards building that growth mindset that I wrote of earlier in the report.

It was with mixed emotions that we said farewell to our Year 12 students at their final Presentation and whole school assemblies on Wednesday 20 September. At the formal assembly, also attended by numerous proud parents and family members, we were able to recognise the academic, sporting and service achievements of our students. #### **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL**

Welcome to a busy Term 4 which is well under way. This term marks significant transition and planning for the next year for all year groups. In particular, Year 12 have commenced their HSC exams with some students already nearing completion while they consider future pathways. From all reports our Year 12 students have approached the papers with confidence founded on high levels of preparation, particularly with the support of teachers during the 'holidays' and in the lead up to individual papers in the early part of the term.

Year 11 completed their Preliminary HSC exams at the end of last term and have received valuable feedback from teachers as they embark on their HSC studies in Term 4. Year 11 have now completed the Preliminary Course. They are now regarded as Year 12 2018 and have been issued with their new timetables this week. Please note these can be viewed on the student and parent portal. Important information will be issued over the next week including the school's 2017-18 HSC Assessment Booklet and NESA guide to the HSC. A copy of this document will be placed on the website and it contains important policy information for students and carers regarding HSC requirements. Year 11 Yearly Reports will be completed and sent home in the coming weeks. Our newly inducted leadership team have already commenced their service, in particular leading and presenting at our weekly assemblies and will develop their portfolios and initiatives at the leadership camp.

Year 10 move closer to the completion of Stage 5 and their 'junior' schooling and electives for next year discussed and released this term. They will be completing a pre-requisite course for the HSC called HSC All My Own Work which provides an essential introduction of the expectations for Senior study.

Year 7 will be provided information about the study of a Language other than English (LOTE). Year 8 students undertake 100 hours of study of one language (i.e. 4 periods per fortnight) as stipulated by the Department of Education. In 2018 students will again have the opportunity to complete their preferences online. More details are to follow soon via letter and email.

For all parents and students it is timely to remind everyone that due to the extensive construction and related road works around the hospital and school traffic on the roads and footpaths we share with our many neighbours seem to change regularly and get busier and busier. Recently most of the footpath and part of the road on Holden Street was closed near the school so students are advised not to leave the school and make their way to the station this way. Year 7 to 10 students are reminded to cross at the lights on Showground Road and make their way to the station via Mann Street and only Senior students should use Showground Road to make their way to the station crossing on Racecourse Road. Thank you for helping us keep everyone safe.

## School Opal Card – Help Us to Help You!

This email is being forwarded to you by Busways, the bus operator that provides your school bus services, regarding student use of the School Opal card.

An important requirement of School Opal card is the need for students to Tap On and Tap Off when they travel to and from school.

Opal data gathered by tapping on and off is used to determine demand for bus services. If students don't tap on and tap off, services may be cancelled due to the lack of recorded patronage.

With this in mind, we ask for your assistance in reminding your students that tapping on and off at the beginning and end of each trip is one of the conditions of using a School Opal card. This in turn helps us ensure we are able to provide the appropriate level of service to your students.

To further promote the use of School Opal, Busways will also be conducting checks on School Opal cards over the coming months. All students travelling on buses to and from school will be required to show their card and ensure they Tap On and Tap Off every time they catch the bus. Students without an Opal Card will be provided with a brochure to take home identifying how they can get an Opal Card.

Please support Busways staff with afternoon boarding and checks to ensure minimal delays to bus departure times and demonstrate.







Artist, conservator, curator, designer, educator, multimedia, public relations, publishing professional... There's more to a career in the visual arts than meets

If you are in Year 11 and interested in art, you can spend a week this summer at the National Gallery of Australia, Canberra.

Become one of sixteen students selected from around the nation—two from each state and territory—to partiapate in the National Summer Art Scholarship in January 2017.

#### Scholarship includes:
