# **PRINCIPAL'S NEWS**

# The Language of Success

No doubt we have all heard, read and been spoken to about the importance of building resilience in developing a culture of success. Resilience is often referred to as the ability to bounce back from setbacks, rather than giving up. Statements like '*When the going gets tough, the tough get going*' have been attributed to resilience. I too have been an advocate of students (and staff and parents) developing skills that will enhance their resilience to the myriad of tasks and pressures that our school, and life in general, places on each of us. But is resilience truly the key?

I recently read a brief article that made me think further about resilience and what it really means. Even from the simple definition above, *to bounce back from setbacks*, is that really enough to build success? Do we simply want to 'bounce back', or do we want to go further?

In the article that I read, it referred to the fact that determination is probably a more important attribute than resilience. Resilience ensures that we 'bounce back', but determination guarantees that we can move further forward after bouncing back. Determination ensures that we have a "fixed direction towards a goal" and no matter what boundaries are placed in front of us, we can 'bounce back' with resilience and move forward towards our goal with determination.

In our last newsletter I wrote about Dr Carol Dweck's 'Growth Mindset'. This accord between resilience and determination fits perfectly with Dr Dweck's work; to bounce back from adversity and use that growth mindset, and determination, to achieve one's goals. It assumes of course that we have set goals for ourselves, something that I know is very strong among our student population.

With our new Year 12 students about to work through their first HSC course assessment week, I hope that they too have set goals for the coming weeks and use that growth mindset and determination to work towards success.

# Year 8 Debaters

Congratulations to our Year 8 debating team who have won through to the State Championship rounds of the Year 7/8 Premier's Debating Challenge. This team will now compete in a three day Gala Challenge held at Sydney University against regional champions from across the state to determine who takes out the Premier's Debating Challenge for 2017.

In the time that they are at USyd, the team will stay on campus at the historic Women's College, no doubt another wonderful experience for our students. Thanks must go to our P&C Association for their very much appreciated donation to fully fund the expenses of this team in representing our school at the highest level.

# **Futures Learning Team**



Through this project, and in collaboration with two other NSW High Schools, a team of our staff led by Ms Cooper are developing contemporary learning experiences for our 2018, Year 7 classes across the curriculum. One key aspect of this program will be an increased emphasis on investigative learning practices that will enhance student's skills in areas such as collaboration, communication, critical and creative thinking, and presentation skills.

Planning for this project was prototyped with our current Year 7 students in their Enrichment Program classes recently and from this brief sampling, the staff involved drew further confidence in the fact that this will be an exciting new methodology to challenge and extend our students.

Thanks must go to Ms Cooper and her team for the work that they have put into this project to ensure that our students have the very best of opportunity in their learning.

## Master Classes Enhance Student's Learning

We have been very fortunate in recent weeks to be able to offer our students the opportunity to work with experts from outside of our school. Our Year 9 Photography and Digital Media students worked with professional photographer, Peter Solness and had a wonderful day creating some spectacular images and gaining great insight into the use of light to enhance their work.



In addition to this, our debating teams spent a morning working with expert coaches from Masters Academy, a debating coaching group involved with many of the Selective High Schools from Northern Sydney and The Hills areas. This was particularly useful for our Year 8 team who are heading off to the State Championship rounds of the Premier's Debating Challenge in the near future.

## GATS Enrichment Day – Year 5

In recent times we have held two very well received GATS Enrichment Days for Year 5 students from schools across the Central Coast. Students visit our school and participate in lessons presented by Gosford High teachers and students designed to both challenge and excite them across a range of subjects and contexts.

Lessons presented were in the areas of Food Technology, Science, History and Mathematics. In the Food Technology area students investigated the chemical reactions that occur during the baking process when making biscuits; in Science they investigated flame spectra, wind turbines, electric circuits and vortex cannon amongst other things; Mathematics required students to 'draw' a Ferris Wheel using Geoebra software and graphing skills; while in History, students investigated artefacts from different ages and civilisations and were required to classify them through their own research on the day.

From the visits to classrooms and reports from teachers, this was a very well received program and provided great incentive for ongoing learning to the younger students.

Thank you to Mr Madden for his coordination of this program and to all teachers and students who presented the 'courses'.


A sample of the Gosford High School entries can be read below:



On Thursday the 14<sup>th</sup> of November Year 9 Photography and Digital Media was lucky enough to have professional photographer, Peter Solness visit us. Peter ran a day long workshop, teaching us the different features and techniques of light painting. Light painting is the process of taking photos in darkness and using hand held light sources to expose certain areas of the image to light.

Once learning the basics of light painting, Peter took us down to school hall to begin taking our photos. We setup our cameras and turned the lights off. Once the lights were off Peter handed us various light sources to experiment with throughout the day. Some of these light sources included mini torches, fairy lights and neon wire. There were props set up for us to take photos of, these props included vegetables, flowers, an animal skull and a statue of a head. As well as still life we took some portrait photos experimenting with which part of the face we exposed to light.

This workshop exposed us to an area of photography that most of us had not encountered before. We are extremely thankful to Peter for dedicating his time to improve our skills in all areas of photography.


## Year 10 History Vietnam Veteran talk

On the 6<sup>th</sup> November, Doug Lawrence from the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia visited Gosford High to talk to Year 10 students about his experiences of the Vietnam War. Classes 10F, 10D and 10O had been studying Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War as part of their History course.

Doug was enthralling and captivated the students with his personal and authentic accounts of life as a conscript on his Tour of Duty to Vietnam in 1969-70. His frankness and honesty about how the war had impacted his own life, helped to consolidate the students understanding and empathy.

Doug was impressed by the calibre of students' questions and the depth of their knowledge. We are indebted to Doug and his generosity of spirit in donating his time to further enrich our students learning experiences. A big thank you to Miss Hickey for her organisation of this activity.
