Trial HSC

It was wonderful to be able to welcome our Year 12 students back into classes last week following their Trial HSC examinations. In speaking with a number of students, they all seemed to agree that the examinations gave them a fair indication of where they are currently situated in their final preparations for the actual HSC examinations.

The most important part of the process now is for students to concentrate on the feedback they are receiving from their teachers and to use this feedback for further improvement. Students should make time to plan how that feedback can be effectively implemented into their study and preparation for final examinations – even redoing the questions under examination conditions and asking teachers to remark what you have done.

While the school assessment period has been completed, students can still improve the mark that has been sent to NESA. The HSC examination marks and school assessment marks are moderated against each other. If all students do well in the HSC examinations, there is still scope for the school assessment marks to be adjusted upwards.

Keep in the back of your mind - "*If we all do well, we all do well.*"

In keeping with this, thank you to all students who are coming to the Library of a Tuesday afternoon to work in their study groups. This is an ideal way to effectively work with peers and share resources while still in 'work' mode at school. Everybody is welcome.

NAPLAN

Much was said and written in the lead up to this year's NAPLAN tests about the NSW Minister for Education's decision to link NAPLAN results to the Stronger HSC Standards. Students had their first opportunity to meet this standard by achieving a Band 8 result or higher in aspects of NAPLAN. Students will have further opportunities to meet this standard in each subsequent year.

We are very proud of our students' achievements every day and we know that in whatever they do, they give their personal best. Like in everything, one's personal best varies from day to day. Our NAPLAN results for Year 9 students demonstrated that overall, we had fewer students achieve results at Band 7 level or lower than in previous years and this was very heartening. However, there are still areas for us to improve upon.

If we think back to the original concepts underpinning the implementation of NAPLAN, it was to be a diagnostic tool for schools to be able to identify students, and areas within the curriculum, where additional support was required. At Gosford High School we are doing just that. We have staff who are currently working through the NAPLAN papers and examining the markers comments and schedules. They are looking at the scripts of our students and are identifying areas that we need to work on. Our school improvement teams will then investigate those and determine what strategies can be put into place for further improvement.

We will continue to strive for improvement in all of the programs that we offer at the school, both within the curriculum and in curriculum enrichment activities, and hope that we can develop this mindset in our students. It is this that will foster further improvement, not the narrow focus on the results of one test on one day.

Debating

Congratulations to our Year 10 debating team who have won the Central Coast zone series of the Premier's Debating Challenge. They have gone through the preliminary rounds of this competition undefeated.

On Friday 1st September this team, comprising Georgina Buckmaster, Emily Garnett, Sophie Baxter and Trinity Stockwell, travelled to Lambton High School to contest the Regional Final against arch rivals Merewether High. They rose up to a significant challenge and all spoke with impressive poise and substantial arguments. The team argued against the topic that arts and music subjects should be replace by more science, proving once and for all that creativity is more important than facts. After debating together since Year 7, the team should be very proud of their achievement and are a credit to the Gosford High community.

Higher Ability Selection Test

This year, we have introduced that for students seeking enrolment into Years 8-11 the need to sit for the Australian Council of Educational Research's, Higher Ability Selection Test. The results of this test, along with a portfolio of other achievements will be used by our selection committees to determine who will be made an offer into Gosford High School should vacancies arise in any of those Year groups.

We have joined a 'consortium' of other selective high schools who require students to sit this test and all agree to share results so that should students be applying for more than one selective school, the common piece of data on student ability is available to all.

Of course, this is but one piece of evidence used by the selection committees in making their decision. Other evidence such as NAPLAN results, academic competitions and participation in curriculum enrichment activities, all 'paint a picture' of the students who we are able to offer placement to.

This test was administered in the school on Saturday 12 August with results being sent back to the school last week. Our selection committees will meet in the near future to consider the applications received and make offers for 2018 should places be available.

Please provide this information in writing to the Principal. This will greatly assist our school in planning to support your child's health and wellbeing. Please also remember to notify staff in the school office of any changes to your contact details or to the contact details of other people nominated as emergency contacts. We appreciate your assistance in this regard and assure you that any information you provide the school will be stored securely and will only be used or disclosed in order to support your son or daughter's health needs or as otherwise required by law.

Flu Season has arrived at GHS

The school, both staff and students, have been hit by influenza and many other viruses. I encourage students to remain home if they are unwell. The flu seems to take six days to recover from. Students must rest at home or we just spread the illness. Year 12 cannot afford to contract illness at this time.

Year 12

Our vision for all our Year 12 students as they begin their exit from secondary education and transition to post school destination is that they will have maximised their academic potential, developed individual skills and talents across a variety of areas, developed learning strategies to equip them to be independent, selfmotivated and life-long learners, developed emotional resilience, self-reliance, interpersonal skills, the capacity to connect to others and leadership potential with a strong sense of social justice as well as a commitment to fairness and equity. Next week sees Year 12 students commence their final four weeks of school. We have been really proud of the students' focus and commitment to their studies and the quality with which they have engaged in their preparations for Trial HSC exams. As is always the case, emphasis is to be placed on a growth mindset, with students encouraged to reflect on previous assessment and set new targets for improvement. The HSC is an ongoing journey with the goal posts set for HSC examinations in late October. The work leading up to then is about consistent effort and improvement in a balanced and healthy way that supports students to achieve their personal best. We wish our Year 12 students and their Year 11 accelerated peers every success for these exams.

Elective choices for 2018

Students are encouraged to recognise the importance of making good choices based on their strengths, interests and passions for learning so that they will enjoy their learning. Equally, it is wise not to make choices based on what friends are choosing, which teachers might teach it or what parents or siblings may have studied in the past. Good course selection is a key aspect of success for students. In the junior school, it may be about trying something new. The subject selection process is being completed online. We look forward to seeing Year 8 and their parents at our Subject Open Afternoon on Tuesday 5th September from 4.00 pm to 5.30 pm. Students will receive a unique web link on Wednesday 6th September and personal password via their school email account to access the selection platform. Once students have submitted their selections online, they need to print the submission and have this signed by a parent before dropping it into the box outside Mr Bennett's office. Further details can be found in the booklet issued to Year 8 and emailed to parents.

Year 11 NESA Critical Thinking Tests

NESA research indicates that universities and employers consider the ability to think critically as essential for success, and would welcome a formal indication of a student's skill levels in the areas of analysis, inference, interpretation, problem solving and evaluation. In response, NESA have introduced a Critical Thinking Test, which students complete online. Our Year 11 students have been given the opportunity to complete this test, with the test taking 90 minutes to complete. The test is non-curriculum based and focuses on the application of skills rather than the demonstration of syllabus content knowledge. The test assesses three broad domains of critical thinking - Logical Reasoning, Qualitative Analytical Reasoning and Quantitative Analytical Reasoning. Students, who have participated, will receive a detailed report in the next couple of weeks.

Cyber Safety / Awareness

At the last Parent Learning Group Mrs Cooper presented on the ever changing face of social media, cyber safety and gaming. One discussion was about how parents and carers can ensure their children are safe on line by using the appropriate filters and supervision on their home internet. It is all too easy for our kids to unwittingly get caught up giving out personal information over the internet. Simple things like 'tagging' and 'checking in' via Facebook can give undesirables their current location potentially putting them at risk of harm. It is also verv important that students do not send or 'post' inappropriate images of themselves and others. The laws around this type of behaviour are very strict and unfortunately, once these images are sent you no longer have control over what happens with them nor who gets to see them.

Study in the Creative Arts subjects Dance, Drama, Music and Visual Arts provides students not only with strong discipline based knowledge but with the fundamental skills, creative expertise and learning mindset recognised as essential capabilities for the 21st century.

Creative Arts students experience and develop the complex skills required to create and test ideas, generate creative works with confidence, shape inquiry and to critically evaluate and reflect on what they do. Developing an independent, forward thinking, learning mindset is considered critical to the future world of work.

Creative Arts education develops skills in creative reasoning, independent decision making and reflective judgment – skills that are essential, transferable and applicable to the real world. Arts students know how to move from the abstract to the concrete, from idea to representation, from concept to realisation.

Students' work derives from their experiences, interpretations and concerns about this world. In response they can engage with contemporary arts practices that are designed to provoke strong reactions, and make audiences feel uncomfortable with innovative works that question assumed values, attitudes and ideas about big picture issues. They are able to reinvigorate traditional conventions by suggesting new associations, embracing new work, styles, genres and expanded repertoires.

An information package will be delivered to classrooms of all current Year 9 TAS students. Details of the five night excursion and 24 activities included are outlined below. Current Year 9 students in TAS and their families are encouraged to consider this unique opportunity and indicate their interest with a deposit to be paid before the last week of term 3. Students should see their class teacher for further details or call into the TAS block and head for the blue information stand for a permission note.

Students spend five nights and six days travelling from Sydney to Launceston, the Tamar Valley and then on to Hobart and the Huon Valley regions by both plane and coach. We plan to visit a range of venues that focus on the design and making process for products in the fields of engineering, food and textiles. During the day we have scheduled visits to the engineered convict bridge structures in Ross and Richmond, Cataract Gorge suspension bridge, the Tahune – cantilever air walk and the Tasmanian wooden boat company. Fact sheet for parents and carers

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test

NSW schools will participate in a school readiness test between 14 August and 22 September 2017.

The school readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess their technology ahead of NAPLAN Online. The readiness test is not an assessment of student ability. The readiness test allows schools to:

- become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes
- check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online
- provide students in NAPLAN years 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format by completing a practice NAPLAN online test.

Frequently asked questions

Which students will participate in the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Students in Years 3, 7 and 9 will participate.

How should I prepare my child for the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Your child will not need any academic preparation for the school readiness test. This is not a test of their literacy and numeracy skills, but an opportunity for them to experience the online test format and for their school to assess its online testing capability.

How long is the school readiness test?

The school readiness test is expected to include two assessments: a writing assessment* and a combined numeracy/literacy assessment. The duration of each assessment will be approximately 40 minutes.

* Year 3 students will only be expected to complete the combined numeracy/literacy assessment.

When will my school participate in the readiness test?

Gosford year 7 and 9 will be completing the Readiness test in week 9 term 3

How will students be prevented from using the internet or spellcheckers when completing the test?

The NAPLAN Online assessment platform will have state-ofthe-art security protections. The assessment is delivered inside a locked-down browser. This ensures students cannot access the internet or spellcheckers while completing the test.

Will schools and parents be provided with information on the results of the readiness test?

There will be feedback to schools about the technical information gained from the readiness testing. There will be no reporting of student test results from the readiness test.

School Traffic and Parking Around Your Local Community

Parking rules are designed to stop vehicles from parking where it would be dangerous or inconvenient for others. Please consider the residents when parking in streets surrounding your school.

You must not stop your vehicle (that is, bring it to a stop and either stay with the vehicle or leave it parked) in the following circumstances:

- Double parked (that is in the road alongside a car that is parked)
- Across a driveway or footpath
- On a median strip or traffic island
- On footpaths and nature strips
- On or within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing



Within an intersection

Within 10 metres of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights unless signposted otherwise



- In Bus Stop, Bus Zone, Taxi Stand or Taxi Zone signed areas
- At least one (1) metre from any other parked vehicle, close as possible and parallel to the kerb, and facing the same direction as the traffic lane



- Within three (3) metres of any double centre lines
- Within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a bus stop

Adherence to signposting, linemarking and road rules around your school will assist in providing a safe environment for the school community and residents.

- School Bus lights buses use signs and orange flashing 'wigwag' lights to warn motorists and pedestrians that they are picking up or setting down school children. The lights begin to flash when the bus stops and the doors are opened. They keep flashing for about 30 seconds after the doors close and continue even after the bus moves off. You must not drive past the bus in the same direction at more than 40 km/h while the 'wigwag' lights are flashing as there may be children crossing or about to cross the road.
- A School Zone is the area around a school with a speed limit of 40 km/h. Between the School Zone and End School Zone signs you must obey the school zone speed limit. The school zone speed limit only applies on gazetted school days and during the times shown on the sign.
- A No Stopping Zone means no stopping at any time.

A **No Parking Zone** means that you must not stop for more than two (2) minutes. You must remain in or within three metres of the vehicle. - No Parking Zones are suitable for 'Kiss & Ride' – but you must abide by the rules.
